CONCERNS OF THE CHURCH

God does nothing except in response to believing prayer. - John Wesley

- The United States faces a border crisis as the policy known as Title 42 ends. The policy allowed authorities to swiftly expel migrants at the US land border in response to the Covid emergency. As a result, a record number of migrants are poising themselves for what might happen next. Tens of thousands of migrants wait, hopefully in what they think are safe places. The authorities also fear the sheer numbers of those seeking entry and those seeking humanitarian asylum breaching the border, overwhelming those posted on site. We pray this change will have the least disturbance and all will be treated fairly and justly.
- Conflicts between Israel and Palestine continue to intensify daily, increasing the number of fatalities and casualties, raising fears on both sides of the fighting. We have a responsibility to pray for peace in the world. Help us, Lord, to pray for this world you have given us that we may live together as Your children.
- African countries continue to be affected by severe flooding in recent weeks. Today we remember the people of the Democratic Republic of Congo. Over 400 people in the country have lost their lives and all they owned. May God receive their souls and comfort those left behind. Yet amidst all the confusion and destruction caused by the flooding, two babies have been found alive, floating on debris in the waters of Lake Kivu. Thanks be to God for this band of protection afforded to these infants and their families.
- Sixty people have been killed in ethnic clashes in the Indian state of Manipur. Homes, vehicles, churches and temples are the most likely targets of unruly mob violence, causing the displacement of tens of thousands and over 200 injured. Let each person's voice be heard and justice served.
- Australian journalist Cheng Lei is detained in a Chinese prison. She has been there for over 1000 days; the charges against her are unknown, and she has not been sentenced. Access has yet to be granted to those campaigning on her behalf, and she has been without legal representation. May she and others like her find the strength and courage to face all this has brought to her and her family.
- Lawmakers in Hong Kong have passed a bill requiring foreign lawyers to get the Chief Executive's approval before taking part in National Security cases in Hong Kong. However, the National People's Congress Standing Committee said it was up to Hong Kong to decide on such matters. Let us hope this will be practised and implemented case by case.
- The Labour Department announced on Monday that a new "Heat Stress at Work" warning system would operate using a colour coding alert system. Those representing the construction companies have welcomed the concept but fear the new system will create confusion in the workplace. As each sector in the workplace is graded differently, they are calling for a more straightforward approach which would state that all workers would stop

work should the temperature reach a certain level. With this welcome move from the Labour Department, it is hoped that those involved can discuss and agree upon a final solution.
