CONCERNS OF THE CHURCH

- Madagascar is on the brink of experiencing the world's first "climate change famine", according to the United Nations, which says tens of thousands of people are already suffering "catastrophic" levels of hunger and food insecurity after four years without rain. The drought - the worst in four decades - has devastated isolated farming communities in the south of the country, leaving families to scavenge for insects to survive. The UN estimates that 30,000 people are currently experiencing the highest internationally recognised level of food insecurity - level five - and there are concerns the number affected could rise sharply as Madagascar enters the traditional "lean season" before harvest. "This is unprecedented. These people have done nothing to contribute to climate change. They don't burn fossil fuels... and yet they are bearing the brunt of climate change," said UN World Food Programme's Shelley Thakral. May God have mercy on the people of Madagascar, we pray that food and supplies can be found and shared with the people.
- A new approach to protecting young African children from malaria could reduce deaths and illness from the disease by 70%, a study suggests. Giving them vaccines before the worst season in addition to preventative drugs produced "very striking" results, London researchers say. A clinical trial following 6,000 children under 17 months has yielded results that could help to control this killer illness. Following the steps of this trial could save the lives of millions in the African Sahel. As God has gifted the scientists to research and work on this trial, may the world enable this treatment approach through sponsorship and provision.
- We pray for Afghanistan and her people. We grieve and pray for the victims and wounded in Thursday's bomb attack at the airport. Since the fall of Kabul, many nations have been working round the clock and so far, 82,000 people have been evacuated out of the country. Thousands of others remain in the vicinity of the airport waiting to be on the next plane. Countries are rushing to evacuate people by the 31 August deadline. The recent G7 meeting has appealed that the deadline is extended to allow for a more thorough plan to be put in place. However, it is reported that US President Biden will not change the scheduled date. May God protect those involved in this mammoth task and protect those left behind. We thank those countries who have opened their doors and welcomed people in.

- The 2020 Tokyo Paralympics games have begun. Not even the fears of Japan's fifth virus wave could dampen the enthusiasm of the participants. Strict virus rules are enforced and there will be no spectators at the events but as they say 'the games go on!'. May this be a time when all may see and learn from our brothers and sisters participating in these games.
- Malaysia faces yet another turnaround in her parliament with Ismail Sabri Yaakob taking over the post of Prime Minister by a slim majority. PM Yaakob has taken as one of his first priorities to gather a special committee to address the Covid- 19 crisis the country is facing. May his fervour to come to the aid of the people of Malaysia be an indication of his commitment to the people and the land.
- Students aged 12 or above can take their coronavirus jabs at 24 vaccination centres without a booking from Friday. Currently, people who are 60 or older can get a same-day ticket to receive a Covid-19 jab on a walk-in basis. The government decided to extend the arrangement to cover students studying at primary and secondary schools, as well as post-secondary institutions. Those aged 12 to 17 are required to bring along a consent form signed by their parents for vaccination.
- In another move to censor the arts, a proposal has been put forward in that the HK authorities would have the power to revoke approval already granted to movies for national security purposes under proposed legislation on film censorship unveiled by the government on Tuesday. The proposal would empower the Chief Secretary to direct the Film Censorship Authority to revoke certificates of approval or exemption previously issued for films if they go against national security interests. A list of 'banned films' has yet to be drawn up by the government. The proposal would also strip the Board of Review for Film Censorship of its power to consider appeals regarding films deemed to endanger national security. In a time of such uncertainty and insecurity, we seek the guidance of God and the Spirit to take us through these challenging times.
- Pray for our children as they venture back to school. We pray their education will not be disrupted as it has been in the past year.

- We lift up in prayer today the churches and people of all faiths in Cape Verde, The Gambia, Guinea, Guinea-Bissau, and Senegal.
- We are thankful for the many ways in which these countries have moved beyond their colonial histories, especially the scars related to the slave trade; this area's distinctive music and cultural practices of storytelling (griots); economic and educational advances that have lifted some out of poverty; promising transitions into democracy and changes in government leaders; the persistent, faithful witness of churches in the midst of other faiths.
- We pray for those people in these societies who continue to live in abject poverty; an end to policies, systems, and cultural practices that continue to exploit and marginalize some groups; the fair election of more just government leaders who respect the rights of all people; faith communities witnessing and working together for the common good.
